We have talked before about how important our volunteers are to the maintenance of the Garden and earlier in the year, we had a request from Ridge & Partners in Woodstock to see if they could hold a social volunteering day in the Garden as part of their Corporate, Social Responsibility policy. We needed to think about a project that they could help with and it was decided that the relaying of the path from Dog Kennel Lane around the Upper Pond would be of great help.

For our part we ordered all the materials needed, which included coffee and flapjack as well as 5 tonnes of gravel and provided guidance and the tractor and driver for the session.

Ed Moss from Ridge & Partners has sent this article and feedback from some of the volunteers who attended.

"I lead the environmental Champions at our head office in Oxford and we were tasked with arranging a social volunteering day to support local causes with an environmental link. Everybody had a fantastic time and mentioned they'd like to return with family and friends.

A quick update!

For those who regularly walk down Dog Kennel Lane and may have noticed the flooding that occurred at the bottom of the sheep field. The water feed for the Wild Garden comes from a spring in the field the other side of Dog Kennel Lane. From the water trough it is piped under the lane to a large manhole in the Garden and from there into the Upper Pond.



Over the last few months, the pipe under the lane has become blocked, probably with a combination of stones and roots, suggesting the pipe is actually broken at some point. However with a little professional help with rods and jets of water the pipe has been cleared and the water flow resumed. Although the flow has resumed this will, no doubt, need further investigation and repair.

I hope that the 7 ducklings who were thriving in their new pond have found a new home and are still together as a family!
